
## Sons of Malarkey - Gulls Lads (2016)

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**Gulls Lads** is the 3rd release from Portland Oregon 6 piece **Sons of Malarkey**, and offers great insight into this band. They effortlessly mix traditional Celtic songs, **sailing** songs, and originals, all while utilizing a dizzying assortment of instruments – guitar, accordion, fiddle, whistle, keyboards, drums, bass....too many for my **humble** brain to keep track of. Hell, I wouldn't be surprised if there was a **tuba** in there that I just didn't pick up on. And while this might sound like too much for what they do, they make it work. **Very well**.

The CD kicks off with Leaving of Liverpool. I **personally** love this song, and have heard more renditions than I can count. Luckily, the Sons do it **justice** with their blend of classic & modern instruments, giving it a nice **balance** 

between traditional pub song and rollicking sing along, with just enough kick. A perfect way to set the tone. Their **instrumentals** (Fiona's Chicken & Waffles, Killarney Boys of Pleasure & McMahon's Reel) are very **tight** and filled with intricate melodies between the instrumentation. "Rocky Road", "Marie's Wedding" & "Foggy Dew" are equally **well-crafted** – songs that you all know & love, but with the Son's personal **twist** 

added. Rocky Road threw me off with the addition of the keyboard, but it was a welcome change for a song

that everyone knows, and really set the **mood** without drastically altering it. The same with Foggy Dew – they changed it just enough to make it theirs & seem **fresh**, without taking anything away from the depth of it.

The songwriting on the **original** tracks are brilliant, to say the least. "Case for Hurricanes" and "Captain" are slower numbers, with the latter having an almost **bluesy** feel that was unexpected but welcome. "Oh Journey" and "Angel" will have you crying in your



pint if you aren't prepared for it. "So Far Away" and "Tell Me Why" are again filled with their **signature** blend of traditional instruments with modern, and the fiddle **layered** throughout really lifts them to another level. And last but not least, my 2 **favorite** songs on the CD, "To The Gulls Lads" and "Nothing More Honest". To The Gulls is a lyrical **masterpiece**, that's reminiscent on Thousands Are Sailing by the Pogues, and I mean that in the best possible way. Nothing More Honest is a very bittersweet song that really grabbed me, and any song that can stir up **emotion** like that is a winner in my book.

I've never seen the **Sons of Malarkey** live, but after listening to this release I could easily see myself settling in with a pint at my favorite pub and listening to these guys for hours. With songs of **rebellion**, love, loss and hope, combined with expansive instrumentation and a fresh take on the **classics**, it seems they have a little something for everyone. Slainte.
